This Scoping Summary Report has been prepared by Soda Arts Pty Ltd and Kianarra Coastal Connections as part of the Sanctuary Point Library Public Art Commissions.

#### **Walking on Country**

A key recommendation from the Community Key Working Group was to take the entire project team out on Country; to see, hear and feel the cultural significance of the land on which the Sanctuary Point Library will sit.


The purpose of this day was to immerse the team - Council. the architect, the landscape architect and public art team - in a cultural experience of the Bay and Basin area. This experience became the crucial step to inform the cultural narrative of the library.

The program for the day was created by Matt Simms of Djiriba Waagura Pty Ltd. It included visiting sites of significance, a smoking ceremony, walking and sharing cultural stories.

Aunty Julie Freeman performed the Welcome to Country and shared her extensive cultural connections to Country. Clive Freeman shared his geological expertise, providing a scientific and cultural context.

Unfortunately due to the recent inclement weather, the visit to Christian's Minde was postponed. Iain Brammer of Taylor Brammer Landscape Architects was able to visit at a later date with Matt Simms.

The outcome of this experience shifted the focus of the project away from a cultural narrative expressed only through public art, to a site-wide cultural narrative expressed across the built,
