Cooperative Manager's Report

Libraries are a smart investment, transforming lives and communities and passionately advocating for lifelong learning. In 2022-23 Australians made more than 56 million physical visits to libraries, enjoyed nearly 5 million hours of internet and Wi-Fi access and booked over half a million hours in meeting spaces in public libraries. They also ran more than 259,000 programs and made available over 42 million collection items.

Our public libraries are for everyone in the community. They run programs aimed at people in all stages of life and cover topics ranging from early literacy to aged care reform. They play a key role in bridging the digital divide by providing access to computers and Wi-Fi, and through their professional staff who can work with people to build digital ability. Libraries and information services are welcoming, inclusive and safe places where all Australians have the freedom to choose what they read. Libraries are essential for providing people in the community with accurate information and skills so they can learn, consider and make decisions about the future. Where else can you learn about the past, read or watch the latest book or movie, or participate in a community event?

South Coast Cooperative Libraries continue to provide a wide and contemporary range of resources both in physical and digital formats. In this financial year over 15,000 new physical items were added to the collection, offering customers a total physical collection of over 163,000 items. In addition to this, there were 156,000 eBook and eAudiobook titles to be borrowed and over 128,000 eMagazines that could be accessed. This split of physical and digital titles is reviewed on an ongoing basis to ensure we are providing the appropriate resources for all members of our community.

As always, a big thank you to partner Library Manager Michelle Hudson and her team for their ongoing collaboration and support.

Please take the time to read this Annual Report, which highlights the myriad services, resources and programs that are provided free to the community through their public library service.

Shoalhaven Libraries Annual Report 2022-23

Shoalhaven Libraries' branches are welcoming, safe and vibrant places that enable our community to thrive and grow. They are highly valued community facilities that provide spaces, services and programs that are community driven.

Shoalhaven Libraries continue to offer a wide range of activities, events, programs and services across all branches, responding to evolving community needs through both physical and digital initiatives to promote literacy, engagement, and accessibility for all our library patrons.

A notable addition to our suite of programs and services this year has been the launch of The Book Bar. This new service ensures that popular and new book releases are readily available to customers, which reduces waiting times, and makes it convenient for readers to access in-demand titles, with new titles being regularly added.

We have also been working on updating the Shoalhaven Libraries Strategic Plan. This new plan has selected five key priorities of People, Collection, Spaces, Technology, and Programs and developed actions to achieve desired outcomes for the community in these focus areas. To inform this plan, consultation and engagement has been undertaken via a Customer Survey, staff workshops, analysis of industry trends and strategic alignment with Shoalhaven City Council's Community Strategic Plan. This feedback helps ensure that the library's strategic direction meets the community's needs and expectations. It is a roadmap that provides clear direction on the future priorities of the library service over the next three years and articulates the objectives and actions that will be required to achieve the desired outcomes. It incorporates the values that library staff have chosen to embody in their work, with a strong focus on customer service, inclusion, collaboration and ensuring our services and programs are community driven.

Design work for the new Sanctuary Point Library continues to progress. This development will be a transformational project for the broader Bay and Basin community and forms a significant role in placemaking in the Sanctuary Point CBD, that will contribute to greater activation of this space. The library and associated community facilities will create a focal point and hub providing an accessible and inclusive range of services and activities, many of which are free, and therefore fee will not be a barrier to participation. The project will provide a range of economic and social benefits and will respond to high levels of socio-economic and health disadvantage in the region. In addition to Council funding, we were fortunate to receive a Public Libraries Infrastructure Grant for \$450,000, which will be used for the fit out of the new library.



Events & Programs

Throughout this year we have held over 565 events both in our libraries and out in our communities, engaging with over 9,100 people.

During NAIDOC Week, we hosted local group Gadhungul Murring who ran creative, interactive workshops for children at all our branches, sharing stories and assisting children in designing and decorating boomerangs to take home. This was a fun and hands-on way to teach the significance of boomerangs in Indigenous Australian culture.

In July we also celebrated Library and Information Week. This year's theme was 'Rewrite, Renew, Reimagine', and Nowra Library created an engaging display of modern retellings of classic novels, which was a fantastic way to connect literature across generations.

Children's Book Week was bigger and better than ever. This year's theme was 'Dreaming with eyes open' and there were special storytimes, competitions for children of all ages, beautiful displays at all our libraries and our famous reader's theatre performances for local schools - both in the library and on the road. The Book Week Roadshow is highly anticipated by local schools and this year the library took the roadshow to ten locations around the Shoalhaven and performed to over 1,300 local students and their teachers.

Regular events held at our libraries include craft sessions for adults and weekly knit-ins, Coding Club, LEGO Clubs and robot workshops, as well as Rhymetimes and Storytimes, and during the school holidays we run many fun and creative sessions. The library embraces online platforms by producing and hosting storytimes on Facebook. The inclusion of Auslan interpretation demonstrates our commitment to accessibility and inclusivity, thanks to the support of ALIA and Deaf Connect.







We love collaborating with our communities and over the past year have joined forces with South Coast Writers Centre to facilitate writing workshops, with well-known authors such as Alison Tait and Gabby Stroud for young adults, and with GRIT to run resilience workshops for children. We held a special Speechie Library Talk Storytime with a guest storyteller, local speech pathologist Christopher Bogg, who read some stories and discussed how caregivers can support their child's language and literacy development. Nowra and Ulladulla Libraries invited artist Glenn Kilby to lead portrait sketching workshops, and we also held a 'Plant Your Feet' session in Ulladulla where the community could sgraffito (scratch), add to, stamp, draw, paint or write on a terracotta tile, reflecting on their connection to the Shoalhaven. Glenn Barkley and Shoalhaven Regional Gallery Artist Educators, Penny Craig and Nicole Ison were there to introduce the participants to making with clay and all decorated tiles were exhibited in Plant Your Feet, curated by Glenn Barkley at the Shoalhaven Regional Gallery in Nowra. In conjunction with Salt Care, a homelessness session was held at Nowra Library. Stories were shared by people of the Shoalhaven experiencing homelessness, with information provided on local assistance available. And finally, Ulladulla Library held a free workshop with guest presenters from Repower Shoalhaven sharing their advice on some simple ways to save money, make your home more efficient and ditch fossil fuels, covering everything from electric heating and cooling systems to electric bikes, cars and home solar.

Winter was celebrated at all our libraries with a range of programs for young and old. Our winter school holiday program included Winter Art, Kaleidoscopes and Whizz Bang Fizz sessions, and a Winter Solstice Storytime was held at Sanctuary Point Library. Our annual Winter Warmers competition was held across all our libraries with some amazing knitters and crocheters entering their creations. 123 items were received for the competition, along with approximately 40 additional pieces donated without an entry. Following the competition, items were donated to local charities, including the Ulladulla Resource Centre and Milton Hospital Renal Ward, for distribution to those in need across the local area.

During June the world celebrated LGBTQ+ Pride Month, honouring the journeys of LGBTQ+ individuals and embracing a larger movement for love, acceptance, and equality for all. We held our first Queer & A evening at Nowra Library in October. It was a great evening where we were able to listen to a panel of queer local community members answer questions and enjoy a drag performance.

Libraries play an important role in providing access to accurate, contemporary, and practical information and to this end various community talks were held throughout the year on a wide variety of topics. These included information sessions on chronic pain; drugs, alcohol, and wellbeing; online scams; vaping; and dementia information sessions including the topics 'What is dementia?', 'Reduce your risk' and 'Building dementia friendly communities'.

Author Talks

The library continues to promote local authors and foster a love of books and literacy in the community by hosting talks and book launches from a wide range of authors, who this year included Kaye Johnston, Adam





Courtenay, Kate Forsyth, poet Peter Bakowski, Julie Bennett, Bill 'Swampy' Marsh, Jackie Bailey, Gillian Wells, Scott Newman, Irene Wilkie, and Tori Haschka, just to name a few.

One of our biggest events was 'Bookfest', which was a fantastic morning held at Nowra Library. This was a showcase of local authors and illustrators in a panel discussion allowing attendees to hear a little about each author and their book(s). The audience were given a chance to ask questions throughout and support the authors by buying their books. Shoalhaven Libraries also purchased copies of the books for the collection so our community can 'Borrow Local'.

In September we hosted a storytelling event for the recently published book 'Our Common Threads', in which 38 South Coast women shared stories of connection through their textile art. These personal and often generational stories of meaning foregrounded the unique expression of women's histories and how their handmade creations can communicate love and relationships. This was a powerful and emotional session for all who attended.

Our Local Heritage Librarian, Megan Crook, launched local historian Alan Clark's latest book 'Delivering the News' at the Nowra Museum with more than 40 people in attendance, including descendants of people featured in the book. This book explores the fascinating history of the Shoalhaven press and its community minded people.

These are all wonderful ways to promote reading and support local talent.

Technology

Shoalhaven Libraries offer various initiatives and programs to support digital technology and create lifelong learning for their patrons. Shoalhaven Libraries places a strong emphasis on digital assistance and training, addressing the high demand for these services as we continue to receive requests for help and support. Libraries are viewed as accessible and trusted community institutions and play a vital role in helping individuals become proficient digital citizens.

Tech Savvy Seniors classes were held during February and March, offering a range of classes for our senior community. Sessions ranged from an 'Introduction to Social Media', 'Introduction to Online Shopping', 'Introduction to Cyber Safety' to 'Managing your Digital Assets'. These sessions were made available following the receipt of grant funding from the NSW Government and Telstra, managed by the State Library of NSW.

Our Tech Help sessions have been extended to include Ulladulla and Sanctuary Point Libraries, where community members can receive 15 minutes of free assistance from library staff for their digital needs, and this year we celebrate 10 years of offering this service to our patrons at Nowra Library.

Get Online Week, Safer Internet Day and National eSmart Week were all celebrated with lots of fantastic activities on offer, which included free morning teas with online games to try, and free webinars on eSafety and related topics that enhance the online safety of the community, such as 'eSafety 101', 'Setting your child up for success online', 'Getting the most out of Gaming' and 'Navigating online Friendships'.

Utilising grant funding received from the Good Things Foundation, Be Connected classes were held at our Sanctuary Point and Ulladulla Libraries. Classes were free and assisted patrons navigating the online world, which can be tricky at first, but this series of classes helped teach the essential skills to get started online.

Local Heritage

The oral history project 'Multicultural Shoalhaven', created with help from the State Library of New South Wales, is now complete and available on our catalogue to listen to and be fascinated by the stories of Shoalhaven immigrants. These stories capture the diverse cultural heritage of our area. Our oral history collection continues to grow with voices from the local community.

In August we celebrated National Family History Month and promoted free online events and family history resources available at the library. Then in September we were extremely excited to launch a Community Cookbook created as a part of History Week, now available as an eBook on our digital platform BorrowBox.

Our local heritage room featured various displays, courtesy of a local collector and the Shoalhaven Historical Society, and our weekly Flashback Friday posts shared snapshots of life in the Shoalhaven in years gone by.

Collection

Our BorrowBox platform has been expanded to include eMagazines. BorrowBox is now our go-to destination for ALL our eMagazines, giving borrowers the best digital library experience possible.

Our collections have also had some new items added to them. We have new energy kits available to borrow, with each kit containing a 10 Amp Powermate to help measure power consumption, a thermometer to help assess surfaces and appliances, a water flow measuring cup to assess water usage, and a guide to assist in calculating your energy and water use.



In November we were lucky enough to receive a National Backyard Cricket grant. The funds were spent on 5 envoy players, which are devices for the vision impaired allowing them to download eAudiobooks, 5 CD players to loan out to housebound borrowers so they can play Audiobooks, as well as a television for Nowra Library to promote our upcoming programs and events. National Backyard Cricket aims to level the global playing field of education in cricket playing countries, promoting education and inclusivity.

We also asked our community for feedback about the types of events they would like to see at their local library branch in 2023. Community members could pick up a survey at their local branch, download a hard copy from our website or complete the survey online. One survey respondent won a fantastic book pack and the information collated has helped inform our future events program for 2023.

Staff

As always, a big thank you to everyone involved in the work that Shoalhaven Libraries do. Our libraries provide a valuable service to the community, playing a crucial role in fostering a love for learning, providing access to information, and creating a sense of community. We all love our library service and look forward to our future opportunities and projects.

It's also truly wonderful to have many dedicated and talented volunteers who generously offer their time to support the library. Volunteers play a vital role in enhancing library services. The contributions of these volunteers not only benefit the library but also create a stronger sense of community involvement and connection.

It's been another fantastic year for Shoalhaven Libraries and I look forward to engaging with our community in new and exciting ways in the future.

Kiama Library Annual Report 2022-23





Once again our libraries continue to be safe and welcoming places for our community to gather, learn and create. Newborn infants are welcomed to our community by receiving a library bag and brochures as well as a board book distributed by the Early Childhood nurse on their first visit. 60 of our Home Library members receive a fortnightly visit with a personalised selection of over 11,000 items library materials. Library programs are certainly not confined to our physical buildings!

212 community programs have been held across our libraries during the last year with over 7,660 people attending. Our programs range from author talks, Book Club groups, writing workshops, exhibitions and so much more. 127 Early Literacy programs were provided and enjoyed by more than 2900 attendees. Our very popular School Holidays activities featured a range of programs including family Lego nights, robotic workshops and 3D printing activities that were enjoyed by 812 children. Our Escape Room programs are becoming somewhat of school holiday tradition with this year's Marvel theme being very popular as 27 family groups set about finding clues and solving puzzles in order to complete the challenge.

The Makers and Creators programs attracts an audience of non-traditional library users who have enjoyed creative journalling, making clay ornaments, using Canva and creating mandalas amongst many other activities. One of our most recent innovative and successful programs has been the Death Café. This program is run in partnership with Illawarra-Shoalhaven Compassionate Community and provides a welcoming safe and relaxed space where participants enjoy open, light and relaxed conversation on death, dying and end of life. People can share a story if they wish, or just listen and observe. This has been a great collaboration between our libraries and community groups to foster open conversations and an exchange of ideas in a safe environment.

Our Friends of Kiama Library audiences have enjoyed a series of author talks including local author and former Council Director our Mario Vallejos, Sue Williams author of historical fiction Elizabeth & Elizabeth, Meredith Jaffe and Ryan Butta. It's been great to see our communities returning to enjoy author presentations and catching up over delicious afternoon teas. Our libraries were also involved in a number of book launches including Holly Throsby and Tori Hashka along with Gerringong locals Lyn Beehan and Jim Eames.

Our libraries have also participated in the Great Book Swap as a way of celebrating reading locally and raising much-needed funds to provide culturally relevant books to children in remote communities. People were encouraged to swap one of their favourite books in exchange for a gold coin donation while also selecting their next great read.

The library has produced the second series of the podcast Good Librations. Over the 12 episodes library staff discuss all things book, reading and libraries related and have achieved an amazing 500 downloads to date.

Receiving over 28,700 visitors, issuing 21,154 items, hosting 58 events and 11 exhibitions the local community has truly embraced the new Gerringong Library and museum facility. The Gerringong community now enjoy weekly preschool Story Time sessions and fortnightly Toddler Tales sessions which reflect the needs for the local area.

Our second annual Diagon Alley Twilight Magic Market at Gerringong Library was held on Friday the 14th of July. Over 1000 witches and warlocks and mages and magic-seekers came to a transformed Gerringong Library to purchase mystical wares, have their fortunes told and be delighted and beguiled by musicians and magicians and spooky dancers. With over 20 market stalls – many stocked and run by local young people – atmospheric live music and free henna tattoos care of the magnificent team at SENTRAL, food trucks, airbrush tattoos, a photobooth, fortune tellers, a magician, a dance troupe, cryptic games and fantastical prizes, the local community had an abundance of bewitching entertainment to enchant and delight!



700 people attended the 1st Birthday celebrations on Saturday 3 December 2022. With a full day of scheduled activities, hundreds of people stayed for several hours to enjoy circus performers, a magician, musicians, author, competitions, an exhibition, craft and party boxes, face painting and balloon animals, photos and food.

The partnership between Gerringong Library and the museum continues to offer great opportunities to provide interesting and engaging experiences to our community. The Gerringong & District Historical Society has launched their Night at the Museum program which opens the doors to our facility for an evening's entertainment exploring exhibitions and listening to speakers offering insights into historical events both local and further afield.

Customer feedback

Our libraries participated in National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo) program which is an annual challenge to writers to write 50,000 words of a novel in thirty days. Hundreds of thousands of people across the world kick off on November the 1st in this attempt, with many popular published novels being the result of an author's NaNoWriMo challenge including: The Night Circus by Erin Morganstern, Water for Elephants by Sara Gruen among many more recognisable titles. This year, our libraries wanted to support our local emerging writers' community with a series of workshops aimed at scaffolding their writing practice and providing practical support from published authors. We were able to secure the services of an amazing array of authors including Clayton Zane Comber, Kate Forsyth, author/scientist Jonica Newby and Meredith Jaffe.


These lauded and impressive authors presented on varied aspects of writing; from getting started, story-plotting, research and writing creative non-fiction from a personal perspective. Their workshops were interactive and interesting and gave the attendees the ability to ask questions in-house and have the scope to learn in a kinaesthetic way from recognisable and high-calibre presenters. As a result of this program, we have built strong professional relationships with local and aspiring authors and we look forward to seeing many more local authors published works on our library shelves!

In recognition of our innovative and unique programs, a number of library staff have been invited to present at professional development seminars hosted by the State Library NSW. Staff have shared their expertise in adapting popular activities such as gaming, podcasting and escape rooms into engaging library programs. Staff have also participated in several professional development activities including the SWITCH conference, Local Studies meetings, Readers Advisory seminars and the Sydney International Storytelling conference.

The past 12 months have seen the number of library programs we offer grow along with our membership. A library restructure has provided us with the opportunity to ensure our organisation reflects the program and services needs of our community. I truly appreciate and admire the dedication staff demonstrate by providing amazing programs and library services that are appreciated by so many members of our community.
