Graffiti

Removing graffiti from our
towns and villages



Working together

Graffiti vandalism can be a costly, antisocial, and often unsightly nuisance for the community.

Together, we can take positive steps to deter and reduce graffiti vandalism in the Shoalhaven.

Fight It

Taking action to remove graffiti from your property within 24 to 48 hours is most effective in the ongoing management of graffiti vandalism.

Much of the graffiti in our community is tagged on private property and owners are responsible for its removal. Council can offer professional removal by Council staff (at a cost) or alternatively removal via a Contractor (own arrangement).

If you choose to paint over graffiti, keep any unused paint and a brush handy in case you need to cover further tags.

Prevent It

Simple planning and design strategies can help reduce the likelihood and incidence of graffiti.

Most graffiti occurs on exposed walls and fences. Restrict the available surface and create a barrier by:

- Planting vegetation against solid surfaces
- Using landscaping instead of fencing
- Using mesh or lattice
- Using highly textured or uneven materials for solid surfaces

Install lighting

Installation of vandal-resistant sensor lights may help to reduce graffiti. Make sure they are up and out of reach.

Report It

Plan for easy graffiti repair

Choose surfaces that can be repainted or are easy to clean, such as tiles or polished masonry. Dark colours are less attractive to graffiti vandals. Keep any surplus paint when decorating in case you want to paint over graffiti in the future. Anti-graffiti coatings can also help to prevent absorption, making graffiti easier to remove. Apply coatings to a minimum height of three metres.

Consider a mural

Consider asking a community group or professional artist to apply a mural to your premises. Public art can beautify an area, draw attention to your business and help prevent graffiti.

Join Project Eyewatch

Project Eyewatch is a community group who manage a public Facebook page, enabling locals to exchange information with police about crime and report issues of concern, in real time.
